Students in the elementary school are assessed for growth and proficiency using NWEA assessments, AIMSweb benchmarking and progress monitoring, the OLPA and MCA assessments and also other informal formative assessments. The Read Well Literacy Plan outlines the assessments and required cut scores for each assessment in Grades Pre-K through Grade 3. Each classroom teacher completes a summary notification form on each child that captures all assessment data and reflect student data and whether they have met cut score or not on each assessment given during the year. The NWEA assessments and AIMSweb benchmarking are completed in the Fall, Winter, and Spring of each year in grades K-6. MCA and OLPA assessments are completed once per year in grades 3-10.

Students who are not meeting cut scores in Math and Reading in three or more areas are identified as Targeted Assistance students and qualify for additional Tier 2 or Tier 3 support. Tier 2 is an additional 25 minutes per day of Math and/or Reading instruction. Tier 3 support is Tier 2 support plus and additional 15-20 minutes of Math and/or Reading instruction. These students are progress monitored weekly on reading fluency, math computation fluency, and/or math concepts and applications fluency; depending on their individual need.

Students in the high school (7th-12th) are assessed for growth and proficiency using NWEA assessments, AIMSweb benchmarking, OLPA, MCA III, PLAN, EXPLORE, ASVAB and other informal formative assessments. The NWEA (MAP) assessments and AIMSweb benchmarking are completed in the Fall, Winter, and Spring of each year. MCA III Reading and Math in grades 7th and 8th, Reading in grade 10 and Math in grade 11. MAP testing in Reading and Math 7th-8th, Reading in grades 9th & 10th. Students who are not meeting cut scores in Math and Reading are identified, monitored, and encouraged to take advantage of our summer and after school Targeted Assistance Program.

Teachers and Principals

Our efforts in the areas of RTI, mentoring new teachers, increasing the use of technology in the classroom, and principal and teacher growth are showing a general positive impact on student growth as indicated on MCA IIIs and MAPs assessments. While students are showing growth, there continues to be too many students who are not meeting proficiency on the MCA IIIs.

Teachers and principals continue to work on the alignment of standards within the curriculum and the implementation of interventions based on formative assessments. Implementation and use of technology in the classroom continues to grow. PLCs have had a positive impact on the collaboration and teamwork that is being done within and across grade levels and content areas.

District

The district staff development target areas include showing measurable growth and proficiency on MCA III assessments, providing effective new teacher mentoring, and increasing the use of technology in the classroom. We continue to use Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) as they relate to our Response to Intervention (RTI) process, teacher and principal growth, and implementation of the Marzano Teacher and Leadership Frameworks. The Marzano Teacher and Principal Evaluation Models fulfill the mission of providing clear strategies and measurable goals to help teachers and principals in continuous growth towards being the best educators and leaders they are capable of being. The model incorporates research-based strategies that create causal links to raising student achievement when teachers use the strategies with fidelity.

Equitable Access to Excellent Teachers

Section 1111(b)(8)(C) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) requires that each state take steps to ensure that poor and minority children are not taught at higher rates than other children by inexperienced, unqualified or out-of-field teachers. On June 1, 2015, MDE submitted a plan to the U.S. Department of Education that required all states to address long-term needs for improving equitable access of all students to great educators. The plan was developed with significant stakeholder input and can be found on the <u>MDE</u> website.

- Priority and Focus schools are more likely to have inexperienced, unqualified and out-of-field teachers than Reward schools.
- Charter schools are more likely to have inexperienced, unqualified and out-of-field teachers than non-charter schools.

To reach the goals of the WBWF, it is important to ensure that all students, particularly students from low-income families and students of color, have equitable access to teachers and principals who can help them reach their potential. Beginning with the next WBWF summary, to be submitted in fall 2016, MDE will request information about the district process to examine the distribution of experienced and qualified teachers across the district and within school sites

AGAIN THIS YEAR!

The 2014 Minnesota Legislature recently enacted the following revisions to state statutes affecting school meal benefits. These changes are effective July 1, 2014.

- Lunches must be provided at no charge to students qualified for reduced-price meals.
- Breakfasts must be provided at no charge to all participating kindergarten students.

2015-2016 Meal Prices

Lunch cost for an elementary student is \$2.10 and the lunch cost for a high school student is \$2.50.

Breakfast cost for both elementary and high school students is \$1.00. Students approved for reduced meals receive free breakfasts.

Adult breakfast is \$1.80 and lunch is \$3.60.



Flu symptom screening tool for parents and caregivers

day your child is sick with Influenza-like symptoms and follow the instructions for when to keep the child home and what to tell the child's school.

Does your child have:

1. Fever of 100° F or higher? Yes or No (Take the child's temperature before giving him/her fever-reducing medicine, like Tylenol.)

2. Sore throat? Yes or No 3. Cough? Yes or No

Should I keep my child home?

If you checked "yes" for fever AND one of the other symptoms, keep your child home for at least 24 hours after his or her fever is gone without fever-reducing medicine. For many children this will be 5 to 7 days. Your child should feel well enough to participate in school before returning. If you have questions about your child's health or symptoms, call your child's medical provider.

If your child has been diagnosed by their medical provider with a different disease, such as strep, follow your medical provider's recommendation for when to return to school and call the school nurse to check on the school policy.

What should I tell my child's school?

If you checked "yes" for fever AND one of the other symptoms, tell the school that your child is home with influenza-like illness.





Since former advisor Erin Grafstrom left L/W, Katie Hasbargen and Don Krause teamed up and took over her role as NHS advisors.



The Holiday Extravaganza was next on Saturday, November 21 in the school commons, where NHS greeted shoppers and painted faces of children.









Passive Consent Notice to Parents School District Plan to Survey Students 2016 Minnesota Student Survey

Our school district is asking students in the 5th, 8th, 9th and 11th grades to participate in the 2016 Minnesota Student Survey. This survey is conducted in schools across our state every three years. The survey is given to get useful information from students about how things are going at school, with their peers and about health-related thoughts and behaviors. The information helps us develop and maintain effective programs and provide better services at school and through community groups. The statewide information assists in guiding our state programs. When we get the report, information from the students in our district will be shared with school staff, students, parents and the community.

Our school district has informed parents of such surveys in the past and federal law also requires us to notify parents of this school activity. There are frank questions on the survey about many topics relating to young people's lives. These include the use of alcohol or other drugs, safety in and around the school, physical activity and nutrition, mental or emotional health (stress, feelingbad), illegal or anti-social behavior (theft, chemical use, fighting) and if religious beliefs affect personal decisions. Questions are asked only of 9th and 11th grade students regarding sexual behavior and attitudes. If students are not involved in an activity, they skip the related questions and go on to the next section. The survey also asks about how well school is going, future plans, how adolescent spend their time and about how the school, family and community support them.


The survey is anonymous and confidential. Students do not provide their names, student identification numbers or other personal information. No individuals or families can be identified. The results are reported on the school district's students as a whole. The privacy of the students is protected.
