

That day, Samantha was participating in

Samantha remembers next to nothing about that day. She recalls running in the gym, playing team mat ball.

"I remember touching the goal," she said, "and that's the last thing I remember: My friend told me later that I just started seizing up."

Samantha was transported to LakeWood Health Center and was later flown to Children's Hospital, where she underwent testing.

'We knew she had a hole in her heart," said Samantha's mom, Roxanne.

"They fed the dog, went to school and work. I wanted them to have some normalcy." Samantha was released from the hospital the Friday following her surgery, but stayed nearby until her follow-up appointment on March 29.

On March 31, she returned to school for a partial day, where her classmates and gym class when she collapsed onto the teachers were happy to see her.

"Most of my classmates screamed my name when I walked in the door," Samantha

"When I saw Mr. Johnson (her gym teacher) when I got back, I could tell he was teary-eyed when he saw me."

'Classmates also filled her in on what happened the day she collapsed. My friend thought I had died," Samantha said, "I didn't completely die, but kind of."

Samantha will remain on high blood pressure medication for a time, but is looking forward to her upcoming May 3rd appointment when she will have a stress test that will help doctors decide if she is ready to get back to normal activity.





Softball teams struggle to secure a win



INFORMATION For Parents



IF YOUR FAMILY LIVES IN ANY OF THE FOLLOWING SITUATIONS:

In a shelter

In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation

In a car, park, abandoned building, or bus or train station

Doubled up with other people due to loss of housing or economic hardship

Your school-age children may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act.

Your eligible children have the right to:

- · Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- · Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is your preference and is feasible.
 - * If the school district believes that the school you select is not in the best interest of your children, then the district must provide you with a written explanation of its position and inform you of your right to appeal its decision.
- · Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.

If you believe your children may be eligible, contact the local liaison to find out what services and supports may be available. There also may be supports available for your preschool-age children.


Knowledge Bowl

The Lake of the Woods High School Trap team kicked off its 2016 season the week of April 3rd. Like the MN High School Trap League, the Bears have seen record numbers come out for this year's team. We started with 7 our first year, 14 in year 2, 22 in year 3, 28 last year, and now host 39 shooters this season with a record 12 girls. In comparison, the state has seen an increase of over 30 teams (293) this year and over 10.000 shooters state-wide.

The first two weeks are practice weeks where each shooter will shoot 2 rounds of practice. The third week will be a rain out score week in case of bad weather and the next 5 weeks after that will be our regular season where shooters will shoot one round of practice and 2 rounds of league.

The top 7 shooters will participate in the State Trap Meet in Alexandria in mid-June. Last year's club finished 22 in their division and lost only 2 seniors to graduation off that team. Returning state competitors include McKale Risser (9th), Hunter Nordlof (9th), Jonah Schmisek (12th) McKord Krause (11th), and Ryan Johnson (10th).

Coaches Bob Laine and Matt Grover are excited about the prospects for the upcoming season. "We are still a very young team overall but the majority of our team that went to state are back including our top shooter 9th grader McKale Risser. We expect to finish well down at the state meet this year."

Things to think about during the lazy days of summer

Be prepared for fall sports

The lazy days of summer will fly by and before we know it, practices for fall sports will be starting. Is your child ready? Be prepared for the next school year

As the anticipation for the first day of kindergarten, junior high or college builds for our children, parents can help to make sure they are ready. Children entering kindergarten, seventh grade, and post-secondary institutions have immunization requirements that must be met before classes start. These requirements are part of Minnesota's School Immunization Law. To get a copy of your child's immunization record or if you have questions regarding what vaccines your child needs, please call me at the school or at CHI LakeWood Health. If you have concerns regarding the cost of vaccines, please check with your healthcare provider or public health to see if your child is eligible to receive immunizations at a reduced cost through the Minnesota Vaccines for Children Program.

Finally, a reminder that if your child needs to have medication administered during the school day, an authorization form needs to be signed by you and your medical provider. Medication needs to be in its original container. If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to contact me during the school year at Lake of the Woods School, Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00 am and 3:00 pm or at CHI LakeWood Health.

What is the difference between School Readiness and ECFE classes?

School Readiness is our weekly school classes for 3-5 year olds. The number of days a week for classes are determined by enrollment numbers, and funds. Each school year schedule can vary depending on these two factors.

ECFE (Early Childhood Family Education) classes are offered a couple nights a month in our regular classroom and are generally about an hour and half. These classes are **open to all** parents and their children ages birth to 5 years old. There is always a parent topic discussed at each class. A couple of examples may be birth order, sibling rivalry, and discipline topics.

Who can attend the ECFE events?

ECFE events are open to all parents and their children ages birth-5 years old. Events are offered many times through the school year. Some examples from this past year are as follows: Fall Spook Walk, Carnival, Swim Night, and Preschool Prom/Sock Hop Dance.

Do we have fundraisers to help benefit our classes?

If our program classes are in need of extra funds we may have parents assist with a fundraiser event. This past year we did the Holiday Extravaganza Event in the fall and raised money for our classroom. We were able to purchase class materials, and 4 electronic tablets for the kids to utilize in the classroom.

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New Baby? New to the Area?

It is important for our future planning to have all children in our census files. Census numbers help determine the amount of levy funding that our Early Childhood Program receives from the State of Minnesota. 

Students spent several afternoons collecting maple sap in the city of Baudette. Students were able try firsthand the art of boiling maple sap down to syrup using the High School Lifeskills Room.



Through the use of GPS and telemetry, researchers were able to locate this bear den which contained an eleven year old female with her three 50 pound yearling cubs. The bear den was located approximately 1 mile from any road, in the Thief Lake Wildlife Management area. Researchers explained to students that it is a common den site (under an uprooted tree) other bear dens include, open above ground nest, holes in ground, and culverts.

Bear's Den Visit

L/W Outdoor Club members (L/W 6th and 7th grade students) on Thursday, March 3rd traveled to the Thief Lake Wildlife Management area and got to assist and observe DNR and University of Minnesota researchers conduct research on hibernating bears.

Students got to observe researchers locate a bear den using GPS telemetry, tranquilizing bears, and conducting bear research involving the heart on how it relates to hibernation.

Researchers are attempting to solve the mysteries pertaining to the heartbeat of hibernating bears (18 beats per minute) and how this knowledge could be used to assist in human heart surgeries. Students also got a presentation on becoming a wildlife biologist from wildlife managers at Thief Lake WMA.
