Head coach Jill Olson, assisted by JV coach Karlene Stay returned to the volleyball helm and worked to give the girls a more normal, but awesome season, after limited games and fans last year. This year brought amped fans and competitive games. The atmosphere at the home games brought the team up, with only one home loss all season. Coach Olson said, "This season I had high expectations knowing that a good majority of the players were returning veterans. That, with a combination of the rookies, did not disappoint and far exceeded the level of play I thought we could accomplish! Not only is this a very skilled team, but a group of young ladies with great chemistry."

Aside from all the fun at home games, the girls traveled to tough tournaments playing against AA and AAA teams in Hawley and Burnsville. They played hard all season winning all but one match against BGMR (aside from tournaments). Some season highlights included winning the Battle for the Paddle match for the 5th year in a row, and beating KCC at home in 4 games, the first time volleyball has beat KCC since Olson has coached.

The Bears first game in playoffs was against Grygla. Winning that match, the next day they traveled to KCC for the second round of playoffs. Going into 5 sets, the girls had a very close game, but unfortunately they lost, ending their season.

Senior Captain Madie Draper said, "We put in a lot of effort to put our best forward. I'll definitely miss being close with the girls and the friendships that were made through it all."

Another season highlight was Madie Draper earning her 1,000th varsity dig. Draper led the team with 373 digs for the season. Junior Mackenzie Pieper led the team in kills with 228. Senior Sophia Walton led the team in aces with 50 and also led the team in assists with 385.

Season awards for the team include: All-Conference: Chloe Olson, Mackenzie Pieper, Paige Haack, Madie Draper and Sophia Walton; Academic All-State: Brinna Fish; Rookie of the Year: Kayman Sonstegard; Most Improved: Brinna Fish; Coaches Award: Madie Draper; MVP: Paige Haack. Waylon Johnson finished the season leading the team in tackles for loss (10)


and was awarded as the best lineman. The Bears finished the season with a total of 1754 offensive yards, 406 tackles, 138 points scored, and a new found family.

Covid Cases Remain Stagnant In Minnesota By Mac Imes

Minnesota recorded 4,511 new cases of Covid-19 with another 44 deaths over the weekend. The current cases positivity rate is 10.9% down from the recent peak of 11%. According to the Minnesota Department of Health, the total number of Covid cases since the start of the pandemic has risen to 889,628. Locally, Lake of the Woods County recorded 5 new cases, and since the beginning of the pandemic the county has had 525 cases with 5 deaths. Despite this recent rate of infection in the area is low and according to Mrs. Merchant the low number of cases have not

only allowed the school to remain open but also allowed pre-pandemic privleges such as fans in the building for games and

Although more testing is needed to know if the variant is more severe, it is cause for concern as it "has an unusual combination of mutations that may enable it to spread faster" according to the CDC. In order to help mitigate the spread of the new variant, the White House has introduced new travel restrictions on South Africa.

Are Our School Libraries Under Threat of Censorship? By Annie Beyer

Across the US, schools are dealing with parents and board members who want certain books banned. Historically, this is not uncommon, but those who oppose this censorship, often wonder, where does it end? Is is ever possible to find a perfectly appropriate book? And who should decide what students can read?

On November 8, 2021, Spotsylvania County Public School Board actually called for a book burning. The board ordered the school's libraries to remove books, claiming them to be sexually explicit. The two parents promoting the ban were in opposition to the "sexually explicit" books. The books in question were about same-sex relationships. After a public outcry from dozens of students, parents, and

teachers the board reversed the book ban.

On November 9, 2021 school board member Jill Woolbright in Flagler County, Florida filed a report on a book saying it violated state obscenity laws. The book "All Boys Aren't Blue" is about a man growing up black and gay. Woolbright's main concern was the detailed descriptions of sexual content. On November 14, 2021, Cheryl Massaro, a fellow school board member, replied to Woolbright's report saying "she bypassed district policies and procedures." Cheryl went on to say that Woolbright does not speak for all school board members and was not permitted to speak on behalf of the board.

In many state's parents are objecting to classics like Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird*, and *Beloved* by Toni Morri-

son, claiming they encourage "white guilt" and the teaching of critical race theory.

Mrs. Schwenzfeier commented, "While I respect a parents view on what his/her child should read, I think that an overall ban on books is a dangerous path to go down. The sophomores have just finished a mini-unit on censorship. Overwhelmingly, students oppose book bans."
